In addition to Preserve staff, we thank Rhonda James, Missy Nergard, and campus partners with UW Transportation, UW Event Services, Aaron Bird Bear, Nathan Jandl with Office of Sustainability, UW Communications, and Ingrid Nelson and the Chancellor's office staff.

# **Capital Projects adjacent to the Preserve:**

- The Natatorium project is under construction. The temporary shed should be removed in 2023.
- Vet Med is under construction.
- Design work for creating a bridge across the lake side of Limnology Building is on-going. Expected construction 2023-2024.

#### **Capital Projects within the Preserve:**

- A Work Group has discussed lights along the Howard Temin Lakeshore Path east of Elm Drive to the Limnology Building. The VCFA had requested this become a formal study to further study safety and options.

## LAND MANAGEMENT - Adam Gundlach, Field Projects Coordinator

- Conducted brush resprout control work in University Bay Drive swale, Frautschi Point 2<sup>nd</sup> Oak area, Lot 60 swale planting.
- Coordinated with RES contractor crew to perform late foliar treatments to brush regrowth and herbaceous weed targets at Frautschi Point 2<sup>nd</sup> Oak and UW Grounds Dept Nursery south of Biocore prairie.
- Installed firebreaks and performed burn unit preparations. Updated prescribed burn plans and maps.
- Collected, dried and processed seed to be incorporated into seed mixes for dormant sowing.
- Performed trail maintenance clearing downed trees from trails.
- Participated in Indigenous Placemaking group tour of Willow Creek area and Observatory Hill.
- Facilitated preparations for Ho-Chunk blessing ceremony at Picnic Point entrance and participated in Preserve Center public meeting held Nov 1.
- Performed Preserve-wide site checks and daily Picnic Point fire circle and wood rack maintenance.
